Conflict Minerals Policy Statement

On July 21, 2010, the Dodd Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act was signed into law. The Dodd-Frank Act and related U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission rules require certain companies to disclose the extent to which they manufacture or contract to manufacture contain so called conflict minerals sourced from mines in the Democratic Republic of the Congo("DRC") or adjoining countries. Conflict minerals include tantalum, tin, tungsten and gold, which are used in many electronic components and computer products.

The Hall Company promotes the traceability of these minerals and the transparency of the supply chain. The Hall Company believes its customers should be informed about the products they purchase. While The Hall Company, as a contract manufacturer, is not able to certify as to the country of origin of the minerals contained in the products manufactured by The Hall Company's suppliers, The Hall Company is committed to working with its customers to supply products that meet customer's specifications. The Hall Company will not knowingly purchase products that contain conflict minerals that directly or indirectly finance or benefit armed groups in the DRC or adjoining countries. The Hall Company expects its suppliers to only source minerals from responsible sources.
